



 - Higher first-year unit attainment
- Accessed by more foster students



- Attending more high schools
- 12th grade suspension or exclusion
- Enrollment fee waivers





Why These Barriers Matter

- Larger meaning
- Impacts all students
 - Lower first-year GPA
 - Lower first-year unit attainment
- Foster students more affected

Encouraging Signs & Needs

Foster youth are still less successful

1/3 letter grade lower 4 fewer units earned **Education Plans** Counseling Where to improve **Pell Grants Support Grants** Academic **Foster Students** Success Displacement Academic Disruption **Financial Need**



Recommendations



Ensure foster youth have access to educational support services in college



Increase access to financial supports for foster youth in community college



Provide funding for foster youth specific supports within K-12 systems



Address suspensions and exclusions for foster youth in high school

Trauma informed training for ALL staff




Reduce school mobility for foster youth





2017-18 College-Going Rate for California High School Students




