Cal State University, Bakersfield	<p>Steve Walsh (661) 654-2276 swalsh@csu.edu</p>	Yes	<p>If we pick up a first-year student for our Guardian Scholars Program (GSP), that student is invited to live on campus for the summer before they start the Fall semester, as soon as they graduate from high school (usually June 1 through August 25). Our grant pays for the housing rent and issues food stipends through our Financial Aid Office. For that reason, our participants have to be incoming CSUB students for the Fall (we can't disburse aid unless a youth has applied to the campus and has a student ID number). So the first summer is no cost to them. Our campus offers "year-round" housing (because it is mandated by the CSU), but that comes with caveats. For example, students can stay over the Winter Break (typically December 15 through January 15) if they signed an academic-year lease with the dorms (if they lived in on campus housing in Fall and will also be living on campus in Spring). This doesn't cost them anything, but that does not include a meal plan. We disburse winter break food stipends through financial aid for our GSP students. Students can truly have an unbroken stay from around June 1 through May 18. The second summer is also complicated. Again, we have year-round housing, but the academic year bills are covered by GSP (Summer) and the students' financial aid packages and any AB 12 money they may receive (if all, Winter Break, Spring). So it's 365 housing as long as the bill is being paid. After the last day of finals in May, the students have a choice—to either continue to live on campus for the Summer term (they would now be sophomores or second-year students, paying around \$2000 to live on campus) or to move off campus. If they opt to live on campus, our program will help them at 50%, meaning we will help pay their housing rent, but they will have to get a job to pay their food and other bills. Students who take summer school classes are supported by summer aid, and we help them with rent or food depending on the aid they receive. We never let anyone go homeless. We'd love to pay for everything in the second summer, but if we do, the students typically just sit in their rooms all day. We feel they should either be taking advantage of summer session classes or working to support themselves. Plus, the limitations on our funding mean we have a new crop of students who want that first summer experience, and we need the funding to go to them. And a final answer is I re-read your question: no, students do not need to be enrolled for summer session in the first, second, or any subsequent year to be allowed to stay on campus for the summer, but our housing office is particular about who stays through August. If a student is not planning on living in the residence halls in the following Fall, they expect them to leave by the beginning of August (so they can assign rooms to the incoming Fall group). Spring break: all licensed residents may remain in housing during spring break, no additional fees. Summer: period between end of housing license agreement for the academic year, which is the end of spring semester, and prior to the summer license agreement beginning, usually seven calendar days, foster youth may remain in housing at no additional fees. Prior to fall semester beginning: the period between the end of the summer license agreement and the beginning of the fall semester, usually 11 calendar days, foster youth may remain in housing at no additional fees (providing they will be residing in housing for fall semester). Winter break: housing residents may remain in housing for most of winter break. There is a 10 day to two week period between Christmas and New Year Day where foster youth may remain in housing at no additional fees.</p>

Some students pay with their CHAFEE grant or Pell Grant. Others take out loans but they don't encourage it. Guardian scholars has a relationship with housing to communicate the needs of the student to ensure they can maintain their housing. Students are able to stay in the dorms during winter and spring breaks at no extra charge. Unfortunately, if students plan to stay in the dorms they are required to pay the appropriate fees. On campus housing is offered to foster youth during winter breaks at no charge Youth are housed in dorms or apartments Priority consideration for housing is provided to foster youth during the fall, spring, and summer. Housing deposits are normally deferred until financial aid awards are posted and disbursed. Students must be enrolled in courses to live on campus during these semesters and there are housing and meal plan fees. Foster youth who can't live on campus due to limited financial aid or non-enrollment are connected to local housing programs. We normally have housing discussions with foster youth in the spring semester to prepare them for summer housing. In addition, because our students are required to engage a lot, many foster youth end up renting apartments near the university. Emergency housing is also an option for students who have special circumstances and need temporary housing. Normally this service is provided by the Tuffly's Basic Needs department and they work in partnership with campus or community partners to find the student stable housing.</p>

During our summer break, we will make accommodations, but all of our cadets have summer classes to take – either on ships or shoreside internships. We do offer some internships on campus and folks are allowed to stay in the residence halls if they would like. The one thing we aim to make sure anyone staying is cognizant of (regardless of circumstance for staying) is that none of our residence halls have full kitchens and the Dining Center is closed most of the breaks. 2 of our residence halls have small "community kitchens" with convection ovens and single burners, but it isn't a lot.</p>

At SDSU we offer a program called Guardian Scholars for students who are former foster youth, unaccompanied minors and homeless students through our Educational Opportunity Programs Office. Students must apply for entry into the program during the application cycle to SDSU. If admitted into the program, we work with the student to grant them housing during the breaks which include both summer and winter sessions. For regularly enrolled students who are not apart of Guardian Scholars, I am not 100% sure about this answer. I know they can indicate on their housing application that they will need housing over the breaks, but this is something they would work out with the Office of Housing Administration. In order to access Guardian Scholar benefits, students have to be enrolled in EOP (apply through Cal State Application process). FY students receive priority housing which guarantees a spot for them. They have to pay through their financial aid during the Fall and Spring Semesters. During the summer, housing is free. During the winter, some buildings have to close for the break but OS will support a student that needs to stay by working with housing to find another building temporarily if they are in a building. AB 1228 in fact requires campuses to provide access, however if a student required housing during summer or winter breaks the student is responsible for the cost. Other factors need to be addressed as well. For example, if a student requested housing over the winter/holiday break our program coordinator would need to meet with the student to discuss other options, if available. During the winter break campus is completely closed, including dining areas. It can be extremely lonely and might not be the best environment for a student. For summer, students have access, but might be required to switch rooms depending on where they live during the school year. Also, a student does not have access to housing the summer prior to enrollment. Example, a freshmen this year was not able to move in early prior to official move in day. Currently, I am working with housing and other support programs to clearly outline protocol for access as well as funding to housing during the breaks. But, again cost and environment are concerns. Guardian Scholars (Former foster youth at UCSB) are given priority in their housing assignments. Some of our foster youth will select traditional freshman housing while others may elect apartment-style housing. Generally university-owned apartments are reserved for upper-division students but exceptions are made for Guardian Scholars if their needs are better served in an apartment (apartments don't close during holidays and winter/spring break). Guardian Scholars who want traditional dorms can let us know when they sign their housing application that they will need "break housing" and they will be placed in the residence halls that allow students to stay during winter and spring break. Break housing is offered at no charge though the dining commons are closed so students have to eat off campus. Summer housing is available but students must pay. Often Guardian Scholars enroll in summer school and qualify for enough summer financial aid that they can get by just fine. This year UCSB offered a program where students who were enrolled in 12 units of coursework over the summer were allowed to stay in University apartments for 1/2 price. Guardian Scholars were given priority for this program. Finally, if you have students who are parents, they should get on the waiting list for family housing as early as possible. While it's not guaranteed, Guardian Scholars are typically given some priority for Family Housing.
